3. Course Description

Theory and practice of finding and using basic information sources and question negotiating techniques in information providing contexts, including libraries and information centres. Appropriate and effective ways of providing personal assistance to users in pursuit of information. Introduction to the principles and practices of searching.

Course format: This course will run in person and students are expected to read, watch, or listen to all the assigned materials in advance of our class meeting. Most in-class exercises will be submitted at the end of the class. The course will include a variety of teaching modes including lectures, tutorials, and facilitated class discussion. A high degree of student engagement is required and expected.

Course Requirements: Students are required to submit completed work for all assignments, including those assessed as a pass/fail. Failure to do so may result in failure of the course. Small group meetings and consultation(s) with the instructors may also be required. In-person attendance is mandatory for this course and failure to attend classes may also result in failure of the course.

4. Course Materials

5. Methods of Evaluation (tentative)

A. Assignment 1: Reading responses and class participation [20%], due weekly

You will be required to submit 10 reports on your weekly readings throughout the term (300-400 words). These will be assigned a letter grade (e.g., A-) or letter grade range (e.g., B+/A-).

B. Assignment 2: Weekly class exercises: [P/F]

There are several exercises that will be assessed on a "pass/fail" basis that will be required as part of the weekly classes. These exercises are designed to help with the work of the major assignments and should be completed as assigned. Failure to complete any of these exercises by the last course class may result in an overall course failure.

C. Assignment 3: Rapid Literature Review with Zotero and Covidence [55%]

Working in small groups of 3-4 students, each team will be responsible for conducting a rapid review of scholarly and professional literature in response to an assigned research topic. This assignment comprises several graded components and has multiple due dates (Weeks 4, 7, 8, 10). Zotero and Covidence accounts, using your Western email addresses, are required for this assignment.

D. Assignment 4: Lightning Talk or Short Form Tutorial [15%] + 1000-word abstract [10%] on a pre-approved topic [due Week 12]
