Description: This course introduces students to the legal and policy environment

affecting the fields of journalism, communications and the media with an emphasis on the legal rights and obligations of journalists and others engaged in the information/communications fields. After a general introduction to the Canadian legal system; selected legal topics will be examined including freedom of expression, defamation, privacy, copyright, broadcasting & telecommunications regulation, and other

emerging issues.

Learning Outcomes: By the end of this course, students will:

- 1. Understand the fundamental components of the Canadian legal system including the Charter of Rights and Freedoms, federal and provincial legislation and case law;
- 2. Become familiar with the vocabulary, structure and logic of judicial decisions, statutes and other legal documents;
- 3. Develop an understanding of selected areas of the law that are relevant to the field of journalism and communications, including copyright, privacy, defamation, freedom of expression, and broadcasting & telecommunication regulation;
- 4. Be prepared to write critically and with authority about emerging legal issues and information/communication policy developments;
- 5. Understand the relationship between technological developments and changes in the legal/regulatory environment;
- 6. Understand the legal rights and obligations of journalists, media organizations, consumers and other stakeholders.

Assessment/Grading:

Case Review (10%) (due February <u>tbd</u>)). Further details and specifications will be provided.

Analytical Essays (50%)

Two formal essays (approx 10-12 pages each) on questions/topics to be circulated. The

first essay (20%) is due **March (tbd)** The second (30%) will be due **April 16th**. Further details and specifications will be provided.

Quizzes (3 @ 10%) 4 quizzes will be scheduled during the term (the lowest grade will be dropped) Make-ups will not be held, if you miss a quiz it will count as your lowest grade that will be dropped. Quizzes will be available online via Owl.

Class Participation 10% Attendance at all scheduled sessions is mandatory and the active participation of every student is critical. Please note that the recording of class sessions is not permitted. Half of this mark will be for students bringing a current news item to class to further discussion.

Compassionate Accommodation Academic accommodation may be given to students on compassionate grounds. The situations for which compassionate accommodation can be given must be serious, including significant events such as death in the immediate family, trauma (fire, robbery, harassment, muggings, car accidents, etc.) or emergency situations. Documentation is required. If a member of your immediate family is seriously ill, obtain a medical certificate from the family member's physician and submit the documentation to your Academic Counsellor. If you have been involved in a severe accident, fire or some other exceptional crises, obtain a copy of the police report or be prepared to provide the necessary documentation upon request.

Bereavement Generally, for deaths in a student's immediate family (parents, guardians, caregivers, siblings, spouses), bereavement leave is granted, upon provision of documentation. For deaths within a student's extended family, academic accommodation is given for one to three days, upon provision of documentation. Students seeking additional bereavement leave for other reasons should contact their Academic Counsellors, and provide valid documentation.
