Course Description

This course explores the information management universe, in particular the linkages with library and information science. Students will examine the challenges of information management in public and private sector environments, including the marketing of the IM agenda to senior management and change management within the organization.

Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of readings, assignments, and class participation, students will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate an awareness of professional values and standards when performing information management activities (PLLO 3);
- 2. Analyse major problems of the discipline and profession in a spirit of creativity and critical inquiry (PLLO 2);
- 3. Demonstrate a critical awareness of contemporary information management principles (PLLO 2);
- 4. Communicate and work cooperatively and effectively with others, including colleagues from sister disciplines in information management universe (PLLO 8, 9).

Course Delivery

The course will be delivered online via Microsoft Teams. Each week students will have course readings and a web-based module.

Course participation will take place through weekly online discussions and monthly videoconference calls using Teams.

Direct coaching to students is provided through the draft submission process for assignment deliverables.

The tool used should also be clearly indicated. Wording in the assignment submitted is expected to be your own: If you use any of the AI content directly in your assignment, you must acknowledge that content fully and clearly to avoid a scholastic offence.
